Deuteronomy 10:12-22

Harry Hopkins was an American social worker, the eighth Secretary of Commerce, and one of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's closest advisors. According to a report, Wendell Wilkie once asked President Roosevelt, when he visited the President in his office in the White House, "Mr. President, why do you keep that frail, sickly man, Harry Hopkins, at your elbow?" Said the President, "Mr. Wilkie, through that door flows daily an incessant stream of men and women who, almost invariably, want something from me. Harry Hopkins wants *only to serve me*. That's why he is so near me."



Harry Hopkins was not concerned about what the President would do for him. Instead, he was waiting on the President, eager to serve him in any way he could. In the light of the remarkable account of this man's unconditional service, let us, who claim to be the slaves of Christ, reexamine our motives which accompany our service for Him.

Satan accused Job of serving God for selfish reasons: "Doth Job fear God for nought?...Thou has blessed the work of his hands... but put forth Thine hand now, and touch all that he hath, and he will curse thee to Thy face" (*Job 1:9-11*). Satan was proved wrong as God allowed him to take away Job's possessions and even his family members, and yet Job blessed the God he loved (*Job 1:21-22*).

We who have been purchased and redeemed by the Lamb are ***bought by blood and bound by love***. Whether God blesses us with good things or whether He allows fiery trials to beset us is not really the issue: "Shall we receive good at the hand of God, and shall we not receive evil?" (*Job 2:10*).
