In some religious circles Mary is exalted very highly, and even worshiped and prayed to. Mary has been blasphemously called the Co-Redemptrix. The suffix “trix” is used to make a noun feminine. So “redemptrix” would signify a female redeemer. Yet, there is only one true Redeemer (1 Pet. 1:18-19), and God will not give His glory to another. Mary had nothing to do with the redemption of mankind except for the fact that God used her in a very special way to bring the Redeemer into the world. Mary has also been called the Mediatrix (female mediator), but Scripture clearly says that there is but one Mediator (1 Tim. 2:5), and God will not give His glory to another.

The true Mary of Scripture, like every sincere believer, wanted Christ to increase and herself to decrease (John 3:30). Her last recorded words are found in John 2:5. This was early in our Lord's ministry at the marriage at Cana. A problem had arisen because there was no more wine for the guests. Mary's last recorded words are very instructive. She pointed, not to herself, but to the Lord. This is the only place in Scripture where we find Mary giving instructions to others, and it was the best advice anyone could ever give: **“Whatever He saith unto you, do it.”** Mary pointed to the words of Jesus, and told the servants to do whatever He says.
